## Students on the water days

The MFA hosted high school students from Marlborough for on the water days in April and May this year. These days provide the students with a first-hand experience of the aquaculture industry and the different job opportunities the industry offers. Jono and Kris (Marine Farm Management), Denise Briggs and Craig Prichard (NMIT), Alex (MFA), and Emilee gave talks to the students about career paths and different opportunities they might be interested in. In Pelorus we took the students to a New Zealand King Salmon farm where Charlie took them through a day in the life working on a salmon farm. Then there was a visit to a mussel farm that gave the students an opportunity to dig into the biodiversity that lives on the mussel lines. From Nelson we took the students to Marlborough Oysters to learn about the innovative flip farming method of farming oysters.

Students have even reached out since for meetings to discuss starfish and the restored mussels further. These events are so important for outreach in the community and to show students different career paths they can take!
